


Virginia Code § 19.2-13

Training

What training is necessary to protect SCOPs from harm and to adequately protect the public?

Should training depend on SCOP duties?



Training Requirement Comparisons

- 24 hours = Unarmed SCOP
- 40 hours = Armed SCOP
- 50-53 hours = Armed Security Guard
- 580-1,200 hours = Law Enforcement
- 80 hours = Auctioneer
- 150 hours = Nail Technician



Training Requirements – SCOP (24 hours)

- 8 hours legal procedures, civil law, criminal and constitutional law;
- 4 hours basic and juvenile law;
- 4 hours obtaining an arrest warrant and issuing a Uniform Summons;
- 4 hours Use of Force and Liability issues;
- 1 hour rules of evidence;
- 1 hour court room testimony;
- 2 hours orientation



Training Requirements – Armed SCOP (+ 16 hours)

Armed SCOPs must take:

- introduction to handguns,
- care of handguns,
- range safety,
- principles of marksmanship,
- use of deadly force, and
- justifiable deadly force





