- The Virginia State Crime Commission (VSCC) is a legislative agency, established in 1966, with the mission to "study, report and make recommendations on all areas of public safety and protection."
 - "It shall endeavor to ascertain the causes of crime and recommend ways to reduce and prevent it."



- The VSCC is a criminal justice agency, and routinely receives privileged and confidential information.
- To facilitate the ability of the VSCC to fully investigate sensitive topics, we are exempt from state and federal FOIA laws and requirements.



 While the VSCC investigates topics relating to crime and the criminal justice system, it is <u>not</u> an executive branch agency, and does no enforcement work.



- The VSCC works closely with the Virginia legislature on:
 - Carrying out assigned studies;
 - Proposing new statutes and statutory changes;
 - Making official endorsements and recommendations on criminal justice and public safety issues;
 - Assisting with legislative drafting; and,
 - Analyzing criminal justice and public safety bills during Session.



- The membership of the VSCC is defined by statute:
 - Six members from the Va. House of Delegates;
 - Three members from the Va. Senate;
 - Three members appointed by the Governor; and,
 - The Attorney General of Virginia, or designee.
- The legislative members of the VSCC are among the ranking members of both the House and the Senate.

- In 2013, the Virginia General Assembly passed House Joint Resolution 595.
- The resolution was originally two separate resolutions, dealing with different subjects, that were joined together during the legislative process.
- As a result, there are two distinct parts to the resolution study.



- The first part deals with legal, consensual sexual activity between adult high school students (over the age 18) and high school teachers.
 - The Crime Commission will be deciding whether such conduct should be made illegal.
- This is NOT connected with the second part of the study, and is not within the purview of this work group.



- The second part focuses on child sexual abuse, and directs the VSCC to determine:
 - Laws, regulations, policies, and training practices of the Commonwealth and its agencies governing the reporting, investigation, and tracking complaints of child sexual abuse;
 - Variations or discrepancies in how various agencies receive, investigate, and track cases of child sexual abuse;



- Whether there are any variations or discrepancies that may allow a suspected abuser to destroy evidence, intimidate victims, or interfere with the course of an investigation;
- Recommendations for legislative or regulatory changes to reduce or eliminate any such variations or discrepancies, to increase the quality and effectiveness of child protective services, investigations of child sexual abuse, and prosecutions of suspected abusers.



- The VSCC is directed to convene a work group consisting of the following representatives:
 - A rural and an urban CPS unit;
 - A rural and an urban law enforcement agency;
 - A rural and an urban prosecutor;
 - A rural and an urban city/county attorney;
 - Va. Dept. of Social Services, Division of Family Services;
 - Va. Dept. of Criminal Justice Services;



- Work group representatives (continued):
 - Office of the Attorney General;
 - A nationally accredited child advocacy center;
 - A victim's rights organization; and,
 - Others as necessary.
- All representatives shall have experience with cases of child sexual abuse.

Study Plan



- In addition to the work group, staff will:
 - Conduct a general literature and statutory review;
 - Collect available data from relevant agencies;
 - Survey local CPS units; law enforcement agencies; Commonwealth's Attorneys; and,
 - Continue to meet with key stakeholders who work in preventing, investigating, and prosecuting child sex abuse to help child victims.

Study Plan- Data Sources



- Staff has contacted, or will contact:
 - Va. Dept. of Social Services
 - On-line Automated Services Information System (OASIS)
 - Child Protective Services Accountability System Reports
 - Va. Criminal Sentencing Commission
 - Total # of charges and convictions
 - Va. State Police
 - Total # of offenses reported and # arrests
 - Child Advocacy Centers
 - Total # of children served

- Findings and possible policy options are tentatively scheduled to be presented at the November 14, 2013, Crime Commission meeting.
- Final Crime Commission legislative or policy recommendations might be voted upon at the December 2, 2013, meeting.

- A final report will be published in January 2014.

Discussion- CPS Investigations



- For example:
 - Should there be better access by CPS workers to all relevant victim and offender information files?
 - Should the suspect receive any notification about a right to an attorney when interviewed by CPS?
 - Should there be greater authority for CPS to take a child into immediate custody?
 - Should the reunification policy of DSS be examined?
 - Should retention policies of DSS case records be reexamined?

Discussion- Law Enforcement Investigations




- What is frustrating with the current system, from the standpoint of <u>law enforcement investigations</u>?

Discussion - Law Enforcement Investigations



- For example:
 - Should there be a mandatory investigation by law enforcement within 24 hours of a CPS report (or faster)?
 - Does there need to be better tracking of CPS notifications to law enforcement?
 - Should law enforcement training relating to child sexual abuse be examined?
 - Is law enforcement responsive to the needs of CPS and vice-versa?

 Are the existing criminal laws in Virginia adequate to prosecute defendants who sexually abuse children?
