Background

- ► Mary Jane Burton (MJB) was a forensic examiner at the Department of Forensic Science (DFS) from 1973 to 1988.
- ► The majority of her work was serology.
- Many of her cases were for violent crimes, such as murder and sexual assault, but she also examined a wide array of other types of offenses.



Background

- ► In January 2023, the podcast *Admissible: Shreds* of *Evidence* was released.
- ► The podcast alleged two key areas of misconduct by MJB:
 - Discrepancies, errors, and alterations of test results; and,
 - Misleading testimony in court.




Budget Language

- ▶ 2024 budget language directs the Crime Commission to determine the number of MJB cases, including the total:
 - Case files that contain at least one named suspect.
 - Named suspects who were convicted of an offense related to such testing who are:
 - Incarcerated;
 - On DOC supervision (probation or parole);
 - Executed; or,
 - Deceased.
 - Cases where scientific testimony was provided by MJB.

MJB Budget Language Status

Incarcerated Individuals


- ▶ Of the 66 incarcerated individuals:
 - All are male (39 Black males and 27 White males).
 - Ages range from 57 to 91, with a median age of 66.
 - The most serious offense for each individual is:
 - Forcible sex offense (44).
 - Murder (17).
 - Aggravated assault (5).
 - All have been notified by DFS and referred to the UVA Innocence Project for pro bono legal assistance.



Incarcerated Individuals

► 42 of the 66 incarcerated individuals overlap with the prior *Post-Conviction DNA Testing Program and Notification Project*.

Incarcerated Individuals

- ► DNA Testing Outcome Definitions:
 - <u>Eliminated</u>: individual was not a contributor to the DNA profile obtained from evidence (not the same as exonerated).
 - <u>Inconclusive</u>: insufficient data existed to reach a conclusion, or no DNA profile was obtained from the evidence.
 - <u>Indicated</u>: individual was a contributor to the DNA profile obtained from the evidence.
 - <u>Ineligible</u>: DNA evidence was not eligible for testing due to federal grant funding restrictions.



Completed Activities

- ► Staff has completed the following to address the directives set forth in the budget language:
 - Analyzed the spreadsheet provided by DFS to identify the total number of MJB cases and named suspects.
 - Reviewed ~400 DFS case files to collect PII and offense details for individuals potentially incarcerated or under DOC supervision, as well as cases where MJB testified.
 - Identified the number of MJB cases that overlap with the prior Post-Conviction DNA Testing Program and Notification Project.



Completed Activities

- ► Staff has completed the following:
 - Analyzed case information and coordinated with DOC and the Parole Board to identify incarcerated individuals.
 - Presented to the Scientific Advisory Committee and the Forensic Science Board.
 - Met with numerous stakeholders, including the Commonwealth's Attorneys' Services Council, Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police, Virginia Court Clerks Association, the Virginia Sheriffs' Association, and the MJB Work Group.



Ongoing Activities

- ► Staff will continue to assist DFS in identifying individuals under DOC supervision.
- ➤ Staff will continue to review DFS case files and collect PII and offense details for cases that require conviction verification (~3,000 case files).
