State Cannabis & Travel Laws

Although *limited* cannabis possession and cultivation is legal in VA, the following remain <u>illegal</u>:

- Operating a vehicle while cannabis-impaired
- Consumption or possession of an open container of cannabis while operating a motor vehicle (applies to driver and passenger)
- Mailing, shipping, or traveling interstate with cannabis
- Possession of any amount of cannabis on school grounds or school buses



Survey Background

- **Summer 2022**: The Virginia CCA commissioned a survey by SSRS to explore attitudes, knowledge, and behavior regarding marijuana usage among Virginia residents, specifically as it relates to driving.
- **January 2023**: The Virginia CCA launched its Safe Driving Campaign to inform cannabis users and all Virginians of the dangers of driving while high and to encourage plans for a sober ride.
- **Summer 2024**: The Virginia CCA commissioned SSRS to reissue a similar follow-up study to the 2022 study.








Marijuana Usage



Marijuana Use


In 2024, three out of five Virginia drivers (59%) have ever used marijuana. Of those users, one-third (33%) have used marijuana within the past week.






Frequency of Marijuana Use Away from Home

Six in ten past 3-month marijuana users use away from home at least once a week. This is an increase compared to 2022, when only four in ten used away from home at least once a week.

Perceptions of Drivers

Almost one third (30%) of Virginia drivers believe those who consume marijuana are usually safer drivers. These perceptions are unchanged from 2022.

People who consume marijuana are a danger to others while driving and their driving behavior is impaired

People who consume marijuana tend to drive slower and more cautiously and are usually safer drivers

Frequency of Driving Under the Influence of Marijuana

35% of past 3-month users drive under the influence of marijuana at least once a week. This percentage is up from 26% of users in 2022 who drove under the influence at least once a week.



Past 3-month Marijuana Users - 2022


Past 3-month Marijuana Users - 2024

Frequent users are three times as likely to drive under the influence compared to total Virginia drivers.



Frequency of Being a Passenger of Someone Under the Influence of Marijuana


In 2024, over one-third of Virginia drivers (34%) admit to having previously been a passenger in a car driven by someone under the influence of marijuana. This is slightly higher compared to 2022 (28%).






Plan For a Sober Ride

Almost half (47%) of recent users (past 3-month) claim to always have a plan for a sober ride home. One in ten say they never have a plan.








Attitudes About Dangerous Driving Behaviors



Perceived Danger Levels of Various Behaviors and Driving

More Virginia drivers continue to rate texting while driving, as well as driving after using illegal drugs or consuming alcohol, as extremely dangerous compared to driving after using marijuana.


